<u>Our mission</u>

Our mission is to engage students and community in social and environmental justice. We do this through education, community research, direct action, and organizing. Throughout all our work, we aim to build communities working together for justice and liberation.

<u>Our history</u>

PIRGs were established across North American campuses in the 1970's and 80's as a way for students to advocate for social change and progress student issues as important national issues. SFPIRG was established through referendum by students on SFU's Burnaby campus in 1981. Since then, SFPIRG has engaged in all kinds of exciting work and has positively impacted the lives of SFU students and the wider community.

<u>Our governance</u>

We are a registered non-profit organization under the BC Societies Act with our own constitution and bylaws making us independent from the University, the Simon Fraser Student Society, and the Graduate Student Society.

We are governed by a student-led board of directors who guide the direction, vision and growth of SFPIRG. We also have a team of three unionized staff who carry out the work and hold institutional memory of the organization. SFPIRG uses consensus decision-making as the basis for our work.



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SFPIRG brings together a diverse range of people and our work is centred on a shared set of values. SFPIRG's organizational values serve as a guide for the work of SFPIRG. We invite everyone to come and talk with us about these values and to work with us in translating them into action!

Inclusive and Accessible Space

We recongise and respond to diverse access needs and are committed to the principles of disability justice.

Intersectional Anti-oppression

Action and Organising

Transformative Justice Summer School

In July 2021, SFPIRG put on 4 full-day interactive online workshops on a range of topics connected to transformative justice, including police abolition and getting cops off campus, non-coercive approaches to mental health, and mutual aid. Registration was in the hundreds, reflecting a growing collective awareness of the violence that the police so often perpetrate against members of marginalized populations, and an interest in building alternative safety and support systems in our communities.

The events featured 21 speakers or panelists from 13 different organizations on and off campus, providing many perspectives on abolition and futures without police. Through breakout rooms and interactive sessions, participants were also able to discuss and dream what this looks like in their lives and how we work together towards more just futures.



Growing from the Transformative Justice Summer School

The work of learning and leaning towards transformative justice, abolition, and communitybuilding did not end with the Summer School. Following the School, SFPIRG continued to organise with students on campus through the coalition known as No Cops on Campus. This collective is made up of SFU faculty, students, staff, and union executives who share the goal of eliminating police and policing presence on all SFU campuses while pushing SFU to take immediate harm reduction actions that foster real community safety.
